Brief Description: Letter written by Kerr to his father in which he describes Marash during the siege. The letter describes in detail the condition in Marash from Jan. 21 to Feb. 5. The letter is written at a time when the Turkish irregular troops were attacking the Armenians and the French soldiers. It discusses the ways in which the French and the Armenian soldiers retaliated against the Turks. The letter talks about the hardships that a convoy led by Dr. Crathern met while going to Aintab. Clashes between the Moroccan cavalry and the Turks on the road to Aintab. The Moroccan platoon retreats back to Marsh. Fires shot at Dr. Crathern's car. Dr. Crathern and Snyder return back safely to Marash. The shops in Marash were closed except that of the Armenians. The Turks were worried that the French were going to attack. Leaders of Marash support the organized Turkish bandits. Kerr argues that had America taken the Mandate (i.e. the Mandate of Armenia), things would not have reached to this degree. Apparently the Moroccan platoon went out to guard a 20 wagon ammunition that was arriving for the French troops. All guards were killed and the ammunition was seized by the Turks. Mrs. Wilson taking care of the Armenians. The French commander takes 6 prominent Turkish generals as hostage. The 2nd of January, full swing clashes. The French were on the defensive. Armenians take shelter in the German hospital. The Ebenezer Orphanage. Missionaries trying to put the American flag as a way of protection. Turkish flag began flying on the citadel of Marash. The French shell the city. French Soldiers running short of food and slaughtering horses. Kerr's letter is written sometimes in real time (See p. 19). Armenians who have lost everything during the war began looting the Turkish houses. Armenians disguised as Turks are being sent to Islahiye in order to ask for reinforcements. Beithshallum Orphanage was attacked by the Turks. Kerr accusing the French soldiers for not protecting the Armenians but only themselves. They numbered around 2.000. The siege of Marash starts on Jan. 20th 1920. Reinforcements are not coming. A graduate of Amherst College recounts the massacring of the Armenians.

Brief Description: Optimism fades. Kerr loses hope and says that he did not have any doubt that the Turks were now going to cut their throats. He describes whatever happened in the last 4 days meaning from Feb. 8- Feb. 12. He expresses his astonishment for the fact that although the Turks were defeated, orders came from the French commandant in Adana to evacuate Marash immediately. Turkish leaders writing letters and asking for the help of the Americans. Garabed Bilezikijan had written letters mentioning the letter from the Turkish leaders. Armenians prepare themselves to leave with the French troops. Explains in detail the evacuation. He stays with the patients in the hospital but then takes a decision to evacuate the hospital. Snyder helps him in evacuating the wounded. Dr. Mustapha on behalf of the Turks comes to negotiate with the Americans. Dr. Mustafa with Mr. Lyman and Dr. Wilson goes to the college to have a conference with the French general and his staff. He takes care of the patients. Cooking rice and opening Campbell soup. Mustafa was murdered and they put his body in the bed. When the Turkish delegation came to the American compound they were shocked. There were about 1,000 refugees in the college compound. They sent two Turkish soldiers to guard the compound. Americans intervene to arrange the surrender of the Armenians. At

Beithshallum about 3,500 Armenians were sheltered. In the Armenian catholic church there were about 3,000 Armenians. There were three strongholds (Beithshallum, the Armenian Catholic Church, and the Latin Church). The rest were found in the American college. The total Armenian population stood at 20,000 out of which 9,000 perished. Looting of Armenian houses proceeded. Kerr thinks that Dr. Mustafa was killed by the French.

Brief Description: Memoirs of an Armenian Legionnaire by Sgt. Sarkis Varadian (deceased). The article first appeared in the Hairenik Daily on September 18-19, 1961 in Armenian. The English version was translated by Varad Varadian. It discusses the role that the Armenian Legionnaires played in Marash during the war. The British troops were to withdraw and the second Armenian Legionnaire Battalion along with some French troops would replace the British. The letter notifies that a battalion of 6,000 Turkish soldiers were advancing toward Marash. He arrives with his troops to the city of Marash and finds it empty. Then, he meets with the captain of the 5th Battalion. Turkish troops fire from the fortress and the commander of the French Battalion takes the Vali in captivity until peace terms could be accomplished. But the fighting broke. The local troops numbered around 1,000. They were under commandership of Krete (Quereti). Legionnaire Soghmon Pashalian is wounded while trying to put a machine gun in the main square. The document provides detailed information about the preparations of the Armenian legionnaires in Marash. French plane appears and drops sheets of papers saying that help was on the way. The Armenian soldiers start to strengthen the reinforcements in Marash. On the 20th day of the siege another French plane drops flyers saying that a fully armed division will arrive in two days. Within two days about 8,000

French troops arrived. He writes this article after 40 years upon the request of his legionnaire friends.

Brief Description: The Reverend Father Pascal Maldjian (Maljian)-based on Maldjian's own story in Memoirs de Mgr. Jean Naslain. Vol. 1, p.387; and Personal Interview. Discussing the events of 1916. Police come to interrogate Fr. Pascal thinking that he was supplying Armenian fighters with ammunition that he bought from a certain Armenian grocer. The priest and the grocer were sent to Aleppo to be tried. Describes the journey to Aleppo. Fr. Pascal remains in the prison waiting to be executed. He delivers a message to the local Armenian bishop for helps. Upon intervention the execution stops. He remains in prison teaching French to the prisoners among whom was the son of the Mufti of Aleppo charged as a British spy. After 9 month Fr. Pascal was brought in front of the court. Though he was acquitted as a result of contradictory evidence, yet he was not released from prison. Then by the order of Jemal Pasha 65 of the 120 prisoners were notified that they had been sentenced to death by hanging. Among these was Fr. Pascal. Hagop Agha Kherlakian a deputy in the Ottoman Parliament from Marash intervenes in the matter. He contacts the Apostolic delegation in Istanbul, Monsignor Dolchi who in his turn appeals to the Pope Benedict. The Pope intervenes with the Sublime Porte and the death sentence for all the prisoners was commuted to life imprisonment hard labor. After 28 months in prison freedom comes with the retreat of the Turkish forces pursued by the armies of General Allenby and the Arab Prince Faisal.

Her maternal grand father Garabed Kalehajian was appointed as representative from Marash in the Turkish Congress in Aleppo. She mentions the deportations in Marash in August 10, 1915. Chorbajians are also deported (her five uncles). The family numbered over sixty. After 10-12 days the group arrived to Rayak, a refugee camp, on the outskirts of Aleppo where Armenians were stationed in the thousands. They went to a village about 18 hours ride from Aleppo and were not deported to Der-al-Zor. It was an Arab friend of the grandfather who was helping them to go to their village in Maara. Father gets

involved in road building by the government. Father smuggles the children to Aleppo on his cart. Around winter of 1917 the family reunites. A brighter and hopeful chapter opens in their lives with the armistice of Nov. 11, 1918. Full of joy and happiness the family returns back to Marash. The Chorbajians had three large homes in one big compound adjacent to the Franciscan Father's Church, only a low thin wall separating the two. However, Turks start burning the houses. The family escapes to the Franciscan church. Many were in the church and her cousin was treating the sick. He discovered that the French had plans to leave the city. Arguments began between the Armenian and the French soldiers. It was agreed that the Armenians would follow the French soldiers once the door opens. Later when Mustafa Kemal's troop came they began evacuating the church. Nine Chorbajians had already left with the French. The rest of the Chorbajians moved to Stepan's house. Some of the Chorbajians move to Armenia. Her immediate family stayed at the Badveli's house. In 1922 her father decided that the time had come for them to move on. The family moves to Aleppo, then to Beirut and then to Medford. Then she comes to Hairenik and works there and falls in love and gets married but there are no children.

Dunaway was in Adana and said that Turkish brigands came down on a village near Adana and killed all Armenians there.

He says that Dr. Shepard has learned that the Turkish Nationalist soldiers- chetes, were instructed to kill all Christians on the road. He says that he gave Dr. Lambert a copy of his diary up to Feb 12 since he wanted to make some notes from it. Dr. Lambert promised to forward it home for him so he may have duplicate letters. since he wanted to make some notes from it. He informs his father that he hasn't said anything about the events in Marash since February 12, and has not even kept a diary, except for a few notes. He mentions about Beithshallum orphanage which had a hard time as the Turks shelled it and did their best to burn it. All houses near the orphanage has been destroyed. The Rescue Home was pillaged and burned down. He says that while the Turkish officials are friend to the Armenians the lower class Turks are not friend with Armenians and therefore not friend with Americans. He says he has trouble finding food for 8000 Armenians and that the Turks are also boycotting him. He further says that when Dr. Lambert and Dr. Shepard called on the Mutessarif a few days ago he made a statement which is rather significant that the Turks are armed not for massacring Armenians nor even for fighting the French but in order to resist any decision of the Peace Conference detrimental to Turkey.

hope America is taking some definite action on the Armenian question, not that they see it is not settled yet. Recognizing Armenia as a nation does no good until a good government exists in Turkey. The Turks themselves want good government and would welcome a mandatory by English or America."

Armenians refused to give up their weapon and said that they would die there. The Mutessarif Djemal Bey (the military commander in Marash) was adamant to force the Armenians give up their weapons. The Turkish cannon was taken to Zeitun. Kerr says that the situation in Marash is much better. However, Armenians do not have any work.

As tension was rising in Marash the Mutessarif asked if Kerr can take all the Armenians of Marash into their compounds in a few days if necessary.
